

Wednesday	Standing on God’s promises	<p>Roots and fruits p163</p> <p>Trust is the foundation on which all good friendships are built. But sometimes we can feel disappointed by our friends. Perhaps they haven’t done what they promised they would do, or maybe we thought they would stand by us when life was difficult and they didn’t.</p> <p>Human beings can occasionally be unreliable, but the Psalmist reminds us that God will never disappoint us. <i>“My God is my strength in whom I trust.” Psalm 18.2</i></p> <p>God’s promises are true and we can trust them. They are a strong and sturdy platform that we can stand on.</p> <p>Use the drama on p164 and reflect upon which of God’s promises the children in the script need to be reminded of.</p>

<p>Thursday</p>	<p>Standing on God's promises</p>	<p>Roots and Fruits p165</p> <p>Fruits from the root's activity – Create a promise box. Each child has the opportunity to write or draw their promise to God that they have made to help someone they know who is worried about something at the moment. Put these in a sealed box so the children know their promise will be in confidence.</p>

Hubert, Joe's youngest brother, was in the RNVR and was called up as soon as war was declared. He served on the "Jervis Bay" and was killed on 5th November 1942. His other brother, Peter, was a skipper on the "Royal" and a messeneger.
